

Your children's art covers the walls of their classroom and perhaps the front of your refrigerator and beyond. You may wonder what will make the Art Show at the Concord Free Public Library so special, why are we so excited and why have Candice and Jennifer members of the CCC administrative team and their committee of parents and educators, worked so hard to "curate" this show? In a nutshell it is because we believe so passionately in the role of play and art in the development of young children and we can't believe we have this opportunity to explain to the world – or at least those who visit the exhibit- what is happening when children have the opportunity to let their imaginations soar and their bodies experience the joy of playing with art.

Candice and Jennifer introduce visitors to the Art Show with the following thoughts.

What is Process Art?

Process art is an artistic movement that emphasizes the **process** of making art rather than the final artistic **product - how** the art is being created rather than **what** the finished product is going to look like. The Museum of Contemporary Art in Los Angeles points out that "in process art, the means count for more than the ends." In process art, the art experience is **led** by the **child** rather than **proscribed** by the **teacher**.

Process art is about the *engagement*, the *curiosity*, the *experiment*, the *imagination*, the *joy*. The moment at hand. The immediate feedback. Process art is not about teaching children how to do art. It's about creating a space for them to discover it for themselves – it's about freedom, not rules. By its very definition, process is an open-ended experience, and there are no right or wrong answers. It's inherently personal and perfectly complements a child's natural tendency for original and creative thought.

What Do Children Learn from Process Art?

Children learn best through play and open-ended activities that give them the chance to explore the world around them, ask questions, take risks, and see how things work. Process art allows children the opportunity to be themselves, make their own decisions, and connect with others. As there is no right or wrong way to create in process art, children can create in a way that works for them.

We hope you will visit the show, tell your friends and neighbors about the show, and thank your children for sharing some of their world with you and the town of Concord
