LETTER FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Dear CCC Community,

Last August, I looked at the year in front of us and the work that needed to be done during this time — overseeing the construction of our new East Concord site, renovating our West Concord site, preparing to depart from our Emerson and Ripley locations, restructuring our teaching teams to align with our new two-site model, hiring a new Executive Director, plus our usual and most important yearly work of teaching and caring for our children and their families AND ensuring that we have the financial resources to support all of these important tasks — and I wondered how on earth were we going to do this all and do it well?

But we did it all. And we did it well, in the same way that we do everything: working together and always keeping what is best for our children and our school at the center of every decision.

This fall, we will assume our two-site configuration that was first envisioned almost 20 years ago. This restructuring is possible due to an immense amount of work on the part of a large number of people, some of whom have moved on from the Children's Center, and many of whom are still with us. I am grateful to each of them for their expertise, time, commitment, thoughtfulness, insights, and so much more. Together we have realized a long-held dream for Concord Children's Center – to most effectively and efficiently serve our children, families and community by restructuring to a two-site model, our *CCC Reimagined* project.

I am thrilled to report that we have received almost \$250,000 in capital gifts to help fund *CCC Reimagined*. This is on top of the \$111,772 that was raised by this year's Fund for CCC, the second year in a row that the Fund total has exceeded \$100,000. My heartfelt thanks to everyone who has been a part of these achievements.

The commitment, generosity, and dedication of the CCC community have been constants during our almost 50-year history, and they have both inspired and humbled me during my 19 years as Executive Director. I depart with a heart full of love and gratitude for this community along with the very best wishes for my successor, Suzie Kornblum, and excitement to see where she – together with all of you – will take this very special school next.

PROFILE OF GIVING: Phil and Kara Barr, Brooke and Jessica Jackie and Matt Fishbein, Owen and Isabel

Between their two families, Phil and Kara Barr and Jackie and Matthew Fishbein have been part of the CCC community for 11 years. This year, the Barrs will be starting their eighth year at CCC, with their younger daughter, Jessica, entering the Star Room, and the Fishbeins will starting their fifth year with their daughter, Izzy, entering the Diamond Room. Both families also have an alum child – Brooke Barr aged out in 2021 and Owen Fishbein aged out this June.

"It's hard to put into words how important CCC has been to our family," says Jackie Fishbein. "As first-time parents of a toddler when Owen started at CCC, we felt so supported and have learned so much about how to be parents! We have complete and total confidence that our children are spending their days being nurtured by the most amazing faculty, and we have developed a wonderful community of families and teachers at CCC."

Phil Barr echoes Jackie's remarks. "From day one, we felt understood, supported, and included by everyone at CCC – teachers, administrators, and other families. We have had the privilege of getting to know so many people in town through the CCC community and have made some amazing friendships through these interactions."

All four parents have become involved at CCC. Phil and Jackie are both members of the CCC Board, Kara is a veteran room parent and also helped lead this year's Executive Director search, and Matthew has advised on fundraising at CCC. Phil and Kara have also served as co-chairs of the Friendship Circle, CCC's leadership giving society, for the past two years, and Jackie and Matt are taking over these roles this year. CCC Board member Thomas Doherty started the Friendship Circle in 2018, and the growth of this group over the past five years has been the main reason behind the more than six-fold increase in the Fund for CCC, from \$17,835 in FY18 to \$111,772 last year.

"As Friendship Circle co-chairs, we have worked to communicate CCC's value in the community, why leadership giving has such an impact, and how these gifts benefit CCC students," says Phil. "It is very tangible work and helps further the inclusive and friendly culture of CCC."

Kara agrees, noting that "we have had many meaningful discussions with CCC's leadership team and current families around the school, the role of childcare, future needs of families, and feedback on programming and resources. These discussion in turn have led to more families donating and building the culture of giving to the Fund for CCC."

"Matt and I are excited to step into the role of Friendship Circle co-chairs, although we have big shoes to fill!" notes Jackie. "We hope to continue to strengthen the culture of giving among current and future CCC families. We are also committed to growing the number of Friendship Circle donors so that CCC has the resources to continue living its mission."

And why do these two families support CCC and the Friendship Circle themselves?

"Supporting the Fund for CCC and the Friendship Circle each year is a giving priority for us," observes Phil. "CCC has demonstrated a commitment to excellence in education and delivers this through high-quality, well-trained, long-term faculty. Our contribution furthers this vision, and the impact of our giving is felt every day in the people and educational resources CCC provides."

Similarly, Jackie says that she and Matthew strongly believe in the importance of investing in the organizations that mean the most to them. "We are honored and grateful to be part of such a warm, intimate and delightful community, and we want to lead in supporting our school."

PROFILE OF GIVING: Pat and Andrew Goldstein

When Pat and Andrew Goldstein moved to Concord in 1980, their daughter, Lucy, was one. They were both working full-time and needed full-time childcare.

"CCC had been recommended," recalls Pat, "and seemed like a good fit for us." Lucy started at CCC in the Harvey Wheeler building in 1981.

"We were new parents living a thousand miles from our families and, like all new parents, had many questions about how best to take care of our children," says Pat. "CCC faculty and fellow parents became our community that supported us through our children's preschool years and into elementary school as well." She and Andrew became involved in the CCC community, including Andrew serving as the CCC Board Chair from 1985-1987.

Their son, Max started at CCC in 1984 and had many of the same teachers as Lucy. Pat says that, "by then, we felt safe and confident in our parenting skills, wrapped in the warn cocoon of CCC support."

In 1999, CCC was asked to leave the Harvey Wheeler building and decided to build a new building (what is today CCC West Concord) on the Harvey Wheeler playground. Andrew's company, Thoughtforms, was the general contractor for the new building, and Andrew's business partner and fellow CCC parent, Michael Rosenfeld, was the architect. Through this work, Pat and Andrew became friends with CCC Executive Director Kathy Reticker and her husband, Jack Flynn.

Pat and Andrew's grandchildren attended the Carousel Program at Harvey Wheeler.

"We got to know Pat Nelson, the new CCC Executive Director, through our time spent on the shared Carousel/CCC playground," remembers Pat. At the same time, they began supporting Acre Family Child Care in Lowell where Kathy Reticker was the Executive Director. When Kathy died unexpectedly in 2016, Pat joined Pat Nelson, Jack Flynn, and former CCC Board Chairs Carolyn Stein and Jerry Wedge in forming the Kathy Reticker Forum for Children and Families to honor Kathy's lifelong work.

"As CCC approaches its 50th year in 2025, we enthusiastically support its staff and educators," declares Pat. "CCC was a very important part of our lives when our children were young, and the parenting skills we learned during those years served us well as we raised our children and now as we participate in our grandsons' lives."

"CCC remains a vital force in the community," continues Pat, "supporting local families and educating healthy, resilient children. Walking in West Concord and witnessing the CCC playground activity, it seems that time has stood still. The firetruck, the sandbox, the 'lawn' are hives of mad activity, as they always have been and should be. Children are the future!"



FY23 was a year of building and restructuring – both of facilities and our programs – in preparation for our fall 2023 transition to our long-awaited two-site model. In July 2022, our new East Concord site at 250 Old Bedford Road was an empty farmhouse surrounded by fields. By June 2023, this site comprised a largely completed purpose-built childcare center, including six classrooms, a gross motor space, an activity kitchen, infant/toddler and preschool playgrounds, and long-awaited staff workspace.

We broke ground on the Barn addition at 250 Old Bedford Road in October, and by the end of March the roof was on. Our new East Concord site was largely completed by the end of June, with landscaping and playground construction work scheduled for the summer. On the west side of town, CCC West Concord underwent renovation work in summer 2023 to increase this site's infant-toddler capacity by converting the two existing infant-toddler rooms, the Circle and Heart Rooms, into three infant-toddler classrooms, the Circle, Crescent, and Heart Rooms.

Parallel to this construction work, inside of CCC we were reconfiguring our staff and administration in preparation for restructuring from our historic three sites – Emerson, Ripley and West Concord – to two: East Concord and West Concord.

We held several community events around CCC Reimagined during the school year. In October, we held a community groundbreaking celebration at the Playscape at Ripley featuring the children's music group Rockabye Beats. We bid farewell to our Emerson and Ripley sites in the spring with community picnics at both sites

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PROFILE OF GIVING: Jacquelin and Robert Apsler



Jacquelin and Robert Apsler have been friends with CCC Executive Director Pat Nelson for almost 18 years. They met when Jacquelin was the new executive director of a domestic violence agency, and she and Pat were members of a group of leaders supporting healthy community innovations within and across their communities.

"I found Pat to be a determined, dedicated, and fervent proponent of early childhood education," recalls Jacquelin. "I appreciated and admired her focus on supporting and developing a professional teaching staff, providing a thoughtful, comprehensive, and inspiring curriculum, and prioritizing tuition assistance to benefit a more diverse population of children."

As a retired educator and middle school principal, Jacquelin highly values education.

"An educated citizenry is a vital component of a healthy and thriving democracy. From my experience in working closely with students through the years and more recently working with families living with abuse, the importance of connections, nurturing relationships, and rich learning experiences early in a child's life cannot be overstated. Engaging children early in their lives while they are brimming with curiosity and eager to learn should be part of every child's early experience."

Jacquelin continues: "Research shows that investing in rich and comprehensive early childhood education could greatly mitigate the growing crises in mental health and substance abuse that significant portions of our youth and young adults are battling. Sadly, our society has not devoted the resources to ensure that every child in every community has the opportunity to flourish through guided exploration, playful learning, and nurturing connections with adults and other children."

As a leader in social science research, Robert is also a very strong proponent of early education for all children.

"Through my research, I have seen how the ravages of social inequities, lack of quality education for all segments of our society, and a dearth of strong, caring relationships in children's lives lead to alienation and isolation in our youth."

Jacquelin and Robert are happy to contribute to CCC. "Supporting the tuition assistance program at the Concord Children's Center, an early childhood program we know to be one of the very best, is something in which we believe. We hope that our support will allow even more children from various walks of life to participate."



2022-2023 CCC FINANCIAL OVERVIEW


FY23 was characterized by near-to-capacity enrollment and unprecedented giving to the Fund for CCC, producing operating receipts over \$4 million. We served 169 children from 136 families from 14 towns, with 74 percent of our children coming from Concord. Thanks to the generosity of

donations from the Concord-Carlisle Community Chest, Cambridge Savings Bank, Eastern Bank, and the Trinitarian Congregational Church — which are matched by CCC — together with the state voucher program, we were able to offer tuition assistance to II percent of our families.

occupancy costs starting this October. Thanks to the generosity of our donors, we were able to finance a substantial portion of our construction costs this year, realizing the vision of CCC Reimagined.
