- Beavers can live up to 24 years

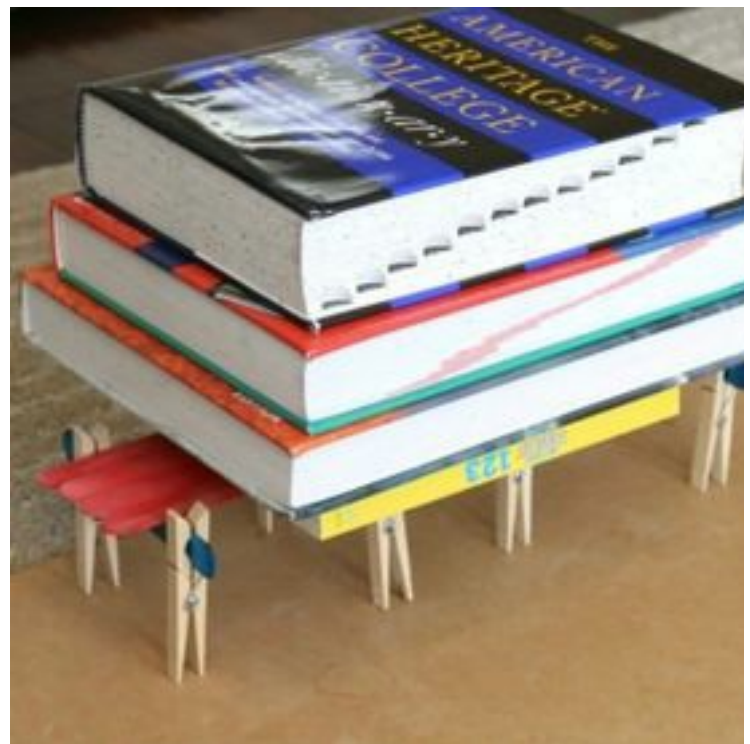
An engineering challenge for this week:

You will need some **wide craft sticks**, some **clothes pins** and some **binder clips** (*the Dollar Store usually carries them*)

Start by challenging your child to use the material to build a structure.



Once they are comfortable using and manipulating the material, challenge them to build a structure that supports weight.



How about testing the strength of the structure.



May be another day challenge them to build a **very tall** structure.



Or they can build a bridge and test it's strength.



Other ideas : make triangles and connect them to build a structure, , or just make dominos.

We have tried these ideas in the classroom before. With our guidance and support at first, they became a fun activity and experiment for the kids to explore on their own. 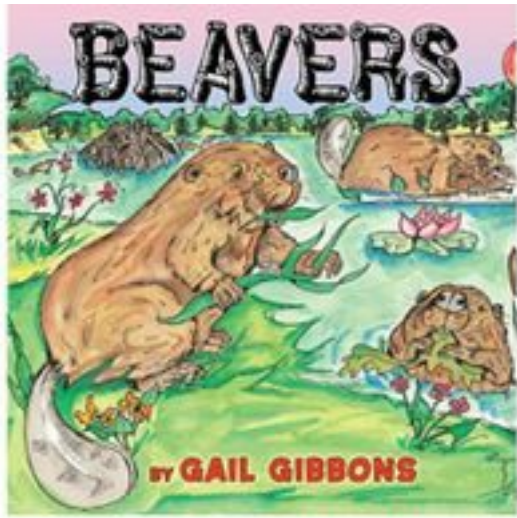
