Continuity of Care at Concord Children's Center

Concord Children's Center follows a continuity of care model for our Infant-Toddler classrooms. The practice of continuity of care (COC) is designed to keep very young children, infant and toddler age, together with their caregiving team over a long period of time, typically two to three years. Each of our infant-toddler classrooms is a mix of 3 infants and 6 toddlers with three teachers. The children in each of these classrooms will stay in that room for their time in the infant-toddler program, thus ensuring continuity for the children from year to year

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At CCC we believe that strong, secure, caring relationships are the heart and soul of quality care for children, families, and educators. COC, based upon attachment research, demonstrates the lifelong impact of supportive, stable relationships that begin in infancy (Sroufe, 2005). In childcare, creating classroom groups that stay together as long as possible promotes quality, family-like, relationship-based experiences during these important first years.
