Springing Forward — What's Happening at CCC

As I write this, we're experiencing our first truly warm day in quite some time — a "feels like" temperature of 53 degrees that hints at the arrival of spring! It's a welcome reminder that brighter, longer days are just around the corner.

Spring at Concord Children's Center is bursting with exciting events and opportunities! March and April are filled with enriching experiences for our educators, including professional development and wellness activities.



- On March 14, CCC will be closed to families while our teaching teams come together to reflect on the year so far and collaborate on the months ahead. But that's just the beginning! - creating a memory book for each of them.



Update: Upgrading our West Concord Infant/Toddler Playground

In our October and December newsletters, we shared the progress of our plans to redesign and renovate our West Concord Infant/Toddler playground, with the goals of:

- redesigning the space to meet the needs of our current 27 infants and toddlers rather than the original 12,
- resurfacing the space to make it appropriate for our youngest students, and
- redesigning the space to invite the imaginative outdoor play that is a critical part of our mission.

As you know, the project was approved by the <u>Town</u> <u>Historic Districts Commission</u> in December. The project was approved contingent on our filing updated plans and color samples of the rubber surfacing we plan to use These updated plans and samples have been filed with the Commission, and we are now commencing the search for a general contractor. Our landscape architect, <u>LemonBrooke</u>, is guiding us through the process, and we will share a project timeline once it is available.

Professional Development Activities

As always, our educators have been busy continuing their learning through a variety of professional development opportunities!

Loose Parts Professional Learning Community

This three-part series builds upon a CCC 2019 professional learning community (PLC) exploring the concept of Loose Parts through the Loose Parts book series: *Loose Parts; Inspiring Play in Young Children, Loose Parts 2 Inspiring Play with Infants and Toddlers,* and *Loose Parts 3: Inspiring Culturally Sensitive Environments.* A 4th book, *Loose Parts 4: Inspiring 21st Century Learning,* has been added to the series, so our teachers have been revisiting the topic for one night in each of January, February and March.

Loose parts play can foster creativity, problem-solving skills, and imagination in young children. However, getting started may seem daunting if you're not familiar with the concept. Each participant in the PLC has chosen one of the books to focus on, and the group as a whole is reviewing the theory of loose parts and looking at the benefits of loose parts play and play themes in loose parts play. Participants have been collecting loose parts materials and documenting and sharing experiences. Loose parts is a term coined by British architect Simon Nicholson, who carefully considered landscapes and environments that form connections. Nicholson believed that we are all creative and that "loose parts" in an environment will empower our creativity (Nicholson, 1971).





Many play experts and early childhood educators have adopted the term and theory of loose parts. Loose parts are materials that are moved, carried, redesigned, lined up, taken apart, and put back together in multiple ways. Loose parts are used alone or combined with other materials. They have unlimited play possibilities rather than single outcomes, which means that there is not a specific way to use items There is no set of specific directions for materials considered loose parts. The child is the direction.

Adults can offer ample space, time, and the invitation to explore interesting materials (loose parts!) to foster a sense of curiosity, critical thinking, and joyful investigation!

Process Art

On March 11, our educators have the opportunity to learn about process art with **Carrie Becker** of **Transforming Early Childhood Education** at her workshop **Enjoy the Process! Artistic Opportunities for Infants-Preschoolers**. Carrie will share the benefits of process art through hands-on, engaging experiences.

Staff Mandala Painting

The latest in our continued effort to ensure our staff's mental wellness, we will be hosting a staff mandala painting activity the afternoon of our professional day on **Friday, March 14**. Mandala painting is known to be relaxing and meditative, and when done in a group, it can be fun too!

Harvesting the Spirit of Transcendentalism in Education Today: Wednesday, April 2, 2025, 6-7:45pm

Though I do not believe that a plant will spring up where no seed has been, **I have great faith in a** seed. Convince me that you have a seed there, and I am prepared to expect wonders. — Henry David Thoreau Transcendentalism broke upon the American scene in the 1830s and 40s, led primarily by women and men in Concord, Boston and beyond: **Ralph Waldo Emerson**, **Margaret Fuller**, **Henry David Thoreau**, **Elizabeth Palmer Peabody**, **Bronson Alcott**, and others. Transcendentalism was a literary, philosophical, spiritual, and reform-minded movement that challenged the materialism of the day and contributed to a range of radical reforms in religion, education, literature, science, and politics.



Although they didn't always agree with each other, the Transcendentalists shared a passion for learning. Their minds were curious, rigorous, far-reaching. They wanted to grow spiritually and explore more deeply the world around them. There was a sense of shared excitement, a drive to learn and grow. They wanted that for others as well and had some ideas about how to reshape education towards that end.

Our panel of modern-day educators will reflect on their own teaching experiences within the broader context of Transcendentalism and this desire to reshape education.

- Can we find in our own schools some of the seeds they planted so long ago?
- Are Transcendentalist ideas on education still alive and well and growing today?
- Where can we locate their educational philosophies innovation, active learning, experiential education, learning outdoors in nature, student-centered learning, new forms of adult education, learning by doing in the best practices of teachers today?

These and other questions will be examined by our panelists:

- Rev. Jenny Rankin,
- early childhood educator Betsy Siebert,
- Fenn teacher Elise Mott, and
- Concord-Carlisle High School/Rivers and Revolutions teacher Tracie Dunn.

The event will take place in the Goodwin Forum at the <u>Concord Free Public Library</u> and is cosponsored by the <u>Transcendentalism Council of First Parish</u>. This event honors CCC's 50th anniversary and is also part of the <u>Concord250</u> celebrations.

The evening is free of charge and open to the public; however, seating is limited, and attendees are requested to please <u>register in advance</u>.

Join the Board!


